We continue to work diligently to maintain our property and buildings with the help of many volunteers and wonderful leadership from **Joe Kotula**, **ofm**. The Chapel received all new windows this summer and new siding on the front of the building. A maintenance fund was established when the Chapel was originally constructed and proceeds from our annual auction also assist in funding that account. At a cost of over \$ 31,000.00, projects such as this certainly remind us of the important work that our auction committee does and their value to our Mission at the Mountain. As the House of Peace was constructed in the same manner as the Chapel, we have already begun work to revamp the structures around each window in an effort to reduce decomposition of the windows and structure within. We also thank **Joe Higgins** for all of the time and effort he donated to manage this project.

A group of volunteers including **Sarino Tropeano**, **Mike Jennings**, **Brother Crispin** from the Bronx, and **Steve Cooper** replaced the roofs on Sunrise and Holy Lady in August. **Both** roofs were replaced for just about \$1,000.00 in materials. THANK YOU GENTLEMEN!

A land management plan was recently completed by FORECON and was accepted by the Board at our spring meeting. By fully implementing this plan, we will be better stewards of over 274 acres of managed land and forests. This plan calls for initial investments of both time and financial resources over the next seven years. By year ten of the plan, it is estimated that we will be able to harvest enough wood to provide some substantial income to the Mountain while at the same time increasing our saw timber volume by over 12% and the quality of trees within our forests. Brother Joe is already working with volunteers to clear some of our invasive species on the land and begin this long-term sustainability project.
